## Dear Parent/Carer,

Winter has certainly arrived with a bang today. Well done to everyone for doing everything they could to get into school and being sensible in the conditions. Students should not worry about being late in these conditions. Their safe arrival is the most important thing.

Firstly, this week I would like to say well done to our Year 11 students for their attitude and efforts in the recent mock exams. Once again, their conduct was exemplary. In the coming weeks students will receive feedback from their teachers and will receive their grades in a mock results day on 22<sup>nd</sup> January. We have high hopes for this year group and continue to wish them the best and to remind them that their teachers are here to help and support them when they need it. Our new advent attendance challenge is well underway. Congratulations to all of those students who have attended school since Monday 27<sup>th</sup> November and have been to all their lessons. With the upcoming introduction of Martyn's law (following a campaign to commemorate Martyn Hett, one of 22 people murdered in the Manchester Arena attack in 2017) schools across the country continue to develop their lockdown procedures. We have been working through our updates with our students and will carry out a drill before the end of term. To avoid any unnecessary worry, we will warn students and parents in advance whenever a lockdown drill is going to take place.

Our academic spotlight this week is on the music department and in particular our peripatetic teachers who for a long time have been an integral part of the development of our musical talent. We currently have a team of 7 visiting peripatetic tutors- Mr Wilde- Piano, Mr Clarence and Miss Boehringer- vocals, Mrs Tickel- strings, Mr Byrne-McCullough- guitar, Mr Flood- Brass, Miss Purvis- drums and Mrs Lee teaching Woodwind in house.

We have 82 students learning across these instrumental families, with many additional students having access to these tutors through additional clubs, workshops and GCSE/BTEC support.

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The majority of our GCSE and BTEC students have instrumental lessons to support their solo and ensemble performance units of their qualifications and many of our previous music students have gone on to brilliant things after leaving school. For example, 2/3rds of last year's year 13 cohort went on to study Music at University.



The quality and output of the performing arts department continues to impress us all and we look forward to this being showcased in our Winter Showcase performance on Thursday 14th December at 6.30pm for approximately 90 minutes.
