Dear Parent/Carer,

I hope you had a good Easter Break and all the students who are revising are feeling prepared for the final push towards the summer exams. Thank you for your generosity on our non-uniform day before Easter where we were able to make a kind contribution towards the Walking With Centre as part of our School of Sanctuary work. A number of students have visited the centre recently and have been moved by the stories they have heard.

We hosted another mental health hub for parents last week and ran by the Connect Mental Health Support Team. As parents/carers you are the primary person in your child's life so we continue to look at ways we can support you with your child in these areas in a practical way. These sessions have been well received so will be running again in the future.

You will be aware that funding for Schools is incredibly difficult, and I thank parents for their understanding around this. Staff continue to work hard to secure funding by other means, well beyond their normal work, so we continue to provide the best we can for our young people. We have managed to develop an in-school gym and secure grants and funding to develop the 'Stephenson Centre' which you can see on the way into school. This will be a specialist centre to work with young people who need some additional support. We also continue to innovate within the curriculum but your support and understanding of what we can reasonably do with the resources we have is always appreciated. As we approach local elections, and at some point this year a general election, I would encourage you to research, ask and challenge representatives on how they are going to support schools and education – and ultimately your children, at this key stage in their lives.

Last week we welcomed Mary Glindon MP for North Tyneside to the school and we discussed these issues. She also had a tour of the school and was really impressed with what she saw. She spoke to a group of students planting flowers and boxes at the

front of the school. Looked at the progress being made on the "Stephenson Centre", visited our new gym, discussed the work of the Newcastle United Foundation in our school and met with a group of year 8 students who were brilliant. They talked about the local area and their concerns around, litter, vaping stores in the Killingworth Centre and how a small number of students can let the school down in the community and how this does not represent the school.

Mary could not believe that they were only in Year 8. We are fortunate to have Mary and North Tyneside Mayor Dame Norma Redfearn, back in school soon to meet with our Sixth Form Politics students.

We also welcomed our students back from a once in lifetime trip to Iceland. It was a packed itinerary so students could make the most of their experience. On the first day students visited the Bridge between the continents, Gunnuhver hot springs, Reykjanes Lighthouse, Stampar Crater, Sky Lagoon and Hveradalir Geothermal area. The following day they visited Reykjavik, Thingvellir National Park - a setting in Game of Thrones (see photo), Geysir Geothermal Area and Gullfoss Waterfall. On the final day they headed to the Lava Centre and then onto a range of waterfalls including Skogafoss and Seljalandsfoss. They walked up to see a glacier and headed to Reynishverfi beach to see the impressive coastal features on the black sand beach.



The students were exceptional and an absolute pleasure to take away, they certainly did GSHS proud.

We are planning another trip to Iceland in 2026.

We had a worrying incident the week before Easter when a student was knocked into by a car. They are going to be ok, but it is timely to remind our young people to of being careful when crossing roads, particularly when they are part of a group. We did have one student who went above and beyond, and we received a kind letter from a member of the public.
