## Uniform Reminders

A huge thank you to parents and carers for all their support in ensuring that Year 11 are looking extremely smart and have a positive and settled start to their final year.

Just some key reminders:


- Skirts and trousers no longer need to be logo ones but if students want to wear these they can. Students can wear black shoes, trainers or boots.
- Skirts must be black, pleated and a reasonable length. They must not be rolled over, pencil skirts or made of stretchy material.
- Nose and tongue piercings must be removed.
- Trousers must be black and proper school trousers. They must not be: joggers, tracksuit bottoms, cargo pants, jeans, leggings or made of stretchy material.
- Footwear must be all black and low heeled. No high top trainers, Ugg boots, trainers with coloured soles, logos, laces or eyelets.




- Try to ensure your son/daughter attends every day and on time.

- Attend events such as Parents evening.









achievements with you and to keep you up to date in real-time.


Class Charts is also be used to communicate homework.

The SIMS App will continue to be used for reporting, attendance and some whole-school communication.




## **Celebrating Success**

## GSHS Prom 2024


- Provisionally booked at St James Park on Thursday 20th June 2023.

## What happened in 2023?

Exams took place in both 2022 and 2023 after a two-year gap.

Exams in 2023 had fewer special arrangements in place than in 2022, but equation sheets were still provided in Maths and Science.

Exam grade boundaries were adjusted to ensure results nationally were similar to those in 2019.

Exam timetables were written so that papers in the same subject were more than 10 days apart.

Teachers were asked to keep key assessment evidence (e.g. mock exams) so that grades could be awarded if exams had to be cancelled.




The plan is for exams to go ahead as normal.

The government have said that there will be no special arrangements in place in 2024.

It looks as if exams in the same subject will be well spaced as they were in 2022 and 2023. Written exams start on May 9<sup>th</sup> and finish on 19<sup>th</sup> June, but there is a contingency day on 26<sup>th</sup> June.


The government do not currently have a back-up plan in place in terms of keeping key assessment evidence. However, we will retain mock exam evidence, just in case it is needed.










GCSE outcomes across all subjects, for all ages, at grade 4/C and above, England only

Our provisional Attainment 8 figure was 4.90, above the national average of 4.65 and a North Tyneside average of 4.61







- attend school as much as you can and be punctual.

- talk to your tutor, teachers or guidance manager if you need to.




- think that you can't succeed because of COVID every Year 11 student in the country is in a similar position!

## How can you help your child and prepare them to perform?

- 1. Being a role model
- 2. Help them set goals
- 3. Keep them active
- 4. Healthy eating
- 5. Time out
- 6. Sleep patterns
- 7. Unplugging
- 8. Staying cool & calm
- 9. Belief
- 10.Be supportive

Each day you can support your child to make choices which can impact how they perform during the exam period





## **6.Sleep Patterns**

- Young people need between 8 9 hours sleep per night
- Help your child create a relaxing evening routine
- Make sure they don't eat too late at night
- Avoid giving them caffeine or sugary drinks late at night
- Make sure they don't work or revise too late before going to bed
- Encourage them to switch off from social media / technology at least an hour before bedtime

## 7. Unplugging

- Encourage them to unplug from technology everyday
- ✓ Help them switch off from technology at least 30 mins- 1 hr before going to sleep
- Support your child to appreciate the world around them rather than being governed by their phone
- Make sure they put their phone away, & on silent, while they are concentrating on tasks / revision / homework
- Help them learn to have the control to not be obsessed with their phone
- Choose some time each day/week to switch off and unplug from technology with them









## 10. Be Supportive





- Be a good listener
- Be approachable
- Encourage them to take breaks in between revision
- Show some understanding of what they are going through
- Help them deal with their emotions & feelings
- Offer caring advice
- Just be there for them!






- Students prepare for **two** qualifications:
- GCSE English Language
- GCSE English Literature
- Both will be assessed by terminal exams in the summer of 2023
- Exam Board EDEXCEL
- No tier of entry
- Every student sits the same exam
- Grading system 9-1





### **GCSE English Language**


- Paper 1: Fiction and Imaginative Writing 1 hour 45 minutes (worth 40%)
- Section A: Short/long questions on unseen 19<sup>th</sup> Century fiction (1 hour) (24 marks).
- Section B: Two images provides as stimulus for Imaginative Writing (45 minutes) (40 marks)
- Paper 2: Non Fiction, Literary Non-fiction and Transactional Writing (2 hours 5 minutes) (worth 60%)
- Section A: Short answers on two non-fiction texts, followed by a longer response question. (1 hour 20) (56 marks)
- Section B: Two options of writing tasks thematically linked to the reading materials – letter, job applications, reviews etc. (45 minutes) (40 marks)





### **GCSE English Literature**

- Examination texts are studied with a light touch at Year 9 and then studied in more detail during Year 10 and 11.
- Paper 1: Shakespeare and Post-1914 Literature
- Section A: Shakespeare: Part A on an extract, Part B whole text 'Macbeth' (55 minutes) (40 marks).
- Section B: Post-1914 Literature: choose one question out of two. These are theme or character questions. 'An Inspector Calls' (50 minutes) (40 marks)
- Paper 2: 19<sup>th</sup> Century Novel and Poetry since 1789
- Section A: 19<sup>th</sup> Century novel. Part a on extract, Part B on the full text 'Jekyll and Hyde' or 'A Christmas Carol' (55 minutes) (40 marks)
- Section B: Poetry since 1789: one named poem from a cluster in the anthology (Conflict) that will be printed – students compare it to another (unprinted) of their choice. (35 minutes) (20 marks)
- Students then also compare two thematically linked unseen contemporary poems (45 minutes) (20 marks)






### **How Can Parents Help?**

- Encourage reading of all kinds
- Read the texts and discuss them with your child. Watch film versions at home. Encourage students to attend after school revision sessions and lectures. Encourage them to be proactive in their learning – use the internet as a resource and use online study guides to help.
- Encourage your child to re-read all the Literature texts again at home – it is vital they have a good understanding of these texts for the exam.
- Encourage your son/daughter to read and discuss non-fiction texts e.g. newspapers, leaflets, letters and magazine.
- Encourage your son/daughter to attend their English revision session on a Thursday after school. In this session students are planning answers and writing responses to exam questions.
- All students have been provided with revision guides for the Literature set texts.
- Above all stress the importance of English and these qualifications and that hard work in lessons will pay off with a good grade in the exam.





# How can you help?

- Encourage a positive attitude towards Maths and stress its importance. Try not to say, "I was rubbish at Maths" or "I can't do Maths." Research shows parental influence is much greater than teacher influence on this.
- Encourage students to complete all home learning.
- Encourage and support attendance students with 95%+ attendance in Maths make much better progress.
- Help students to learn key formulae test them!
- Ask about their work and praise effort
- Support students to complete independent Maths revision regularly.


